EXTERNAL EVALUATION 2024-2026 FORCERT-BftW PROJECT

January 2025

1. BACKGROUND

FORCERT's Vision:

A resilient and self-reliant community living in harmony with nature, maintaining their traditional culture and meeting the needs of the present. *Yesterday for now and tomorrow.*

FORCERT's Mission:

Our core work is empowering Papua New Guinean communities through community enhancement, so communities take the lead in their change, balancing their environmental, economic, social and cultural values & interests. We do this through sustainable land use & community action planning processes, and through support for village-based enterprises.

We also work at the national & provincial level to inform and influence government policy and practice to create an enabling environment for communities.

We have a separate social enterprise arm promoting and trading ethical & green products from village-based enterprises, supplying to the best possible markets.

FORCERT's Goal:

Communities are smart, wise, fair, healthy and happy. They are implementing their community action plan which is recognised, supported and strong. They have successful ethical and green village-based enterprises supplying to the best possible markets. They respect their Land Use Plan, and conservation rules and maintain their cultural heritage.

(PNG Vision 2050: "We will be a Smart, Wise, Fair, Healthy and Happy Society by 2050")

FORCERT was established in 2003 as a not-for-profit service providing company, originally to help allow access to FSC certification for small and medium scale eco-forestry enterprises and timber yards. FORCERT worked closely with other service providers and stakeholders and built an operating Group Certification Service Network to provide this requested access.

Following the 2013 External evaluation, a major overhaul of the FORCERT organisation, focus and way of work was done. Please see the attached FORCERT Story of Change (January 2015 FINAL) for the details of this process and its outcomes.

2. PURPOSE OF THE EVALUATION

The most important purpose of this evaluation is to evaluate the implementation of the current FORCERT 2024-2026 project with its main funding partner Bread for the World (BftW), and will serve as an early mid-term evaluation for the progress of this project. Although theoretically, a mid-term evaluation for this project should be done in July 2025, this evaluation is being brought forward to March 2025 for practical reasons, as its outcome will also provide essential input for the upcoming 2025-2029 Strategic planning process FORCERT will be conducting in April 2025. This will be of benefit to the current 2024-2026 FORCERT-BftW Project, as this project was agreed to with the understanding that an important part of its implementation would be the development of FORCERT's new 5-year Strategic plan, based on the lessons learned from the current FORCERT-BftW 2024-2026 project to date, the former 2021-2023 FORCERT-BftW project, and from the overall implementation of the 2020-2024 FORCERT Strategic Plan.

The evaluation should use the BftW 2024-2026 Objectives & Indicators, which are embedded in the FORCERT Theory Of Change, and its related key areas such as the enabling factors, key priorities, outputs and expected outcomes. It should also help FORCERT understand its own performance and the extend of its impact on the identified target groups under the BftW project, and its Theory Of Change. From the results of the evaluation, possible solutions to problem areas identified and further recommendations should be developed, to improve the management and effectiveness of FORCERT for the continued implementation of the BftW 2024-2026 Project, and the development of its next five-year strategic plan.

Most important issues to be looked at are;

- i. progress in the achievement of the BftW 2024-2026 Project Objectives & Indicators,
- ii. community engagement & effectiveness of the Participatory Process of Change,
- iii. effectiveness of the National Level Program and Social Enterprise Arm and their link with the Community Enhancement Program,
- iv. the functioning, role and position of the new PNG Communities BEST (Benefits from Environmental Services Trust) Program,
- v. organisational functioning; activity focus, effectiveness, structure & management,
- vi. long term financial security; the role of BftW and other multiple major donors, and income earning & self-financing options and
- vii. current and long-term strategic focus, both geographical and thematical.

3. METHODOLOGY

The evaluation team will work with FORCERT in an open and participatory manner that facilitates the building of staff capacity and maximizes opportunities for staff input. Staff will be available when different team members travel to different locations for interviews with partner communities and (if necessary) for meetings with organizations, government departments/agencies and other stakeholders, and will have chances of being interviewed by any of the Evaluation team members.

There will be different types of interviews used, adjusted to the different types of stakeholders to be interviewed:

- Team and individual interviews for meetings with FORCERT staff,
- Group interview for the meeting with the FORCERT Board of Directors,
- One-on-one interviews for meetings with organisations and government departments/agencies and
- Focus group discussions (women/youth/men) and individual interviews with partner communities during partner community visits.

The evaluators should consider the evaluation criteria ((relevance, efficiency, effectiveness, sustainability, and impact) of the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, and the guidance provided for the use of these criteria for this evaluation, which also include cross-cutting issues such as gender, environment, and accountability to be part of the analysis¹.

The specific focus areas and key questions the evaluation team will use with the different stakeholders, to guide them in conducting the evaluation & review will be discussed and finalised during the opening meeting.

Working in this way will ensure the latest information and views from the management and staff of FORCERT is discussed with the evaluation team, before they go out to gather views from the various stakeholders.

The Evaluation team will gather all the information and feedback from our partner communities, and organisations, and all other stakeholders and prepare a draft report directly after information collection. This draft report will then be presented to and discussed with the FORCERT Manager and Technical Advisor in a closing workshop. The evaluation team will work with the FORCERT Manager and Technical Advisor to develop solutions to address issues identified through the evaluation. A final report should be produced within two weeks after the closing workshop.

FORCERT will assist with all logistical arrangements including organizing meetings for the consultants with the stakeholders and arranging community visits. Key informants for the evaluation will include:
