

Who are CareSouth Champions?

- Early Intervention program founded in 1992 in Shoalhaven region (Nowra – Ulladulla) as 'Aunties and Uncles'
- Aim of the program is to improve CYP wellbeing and developmental outcomes
- Provides youth mentoring to CYP aged 3-12 years
- Relies on volunteer carers



Capturing the voice of the child (or young person)

Historical child protection context

 Supporting the capture of the 'child voice' in evaluations facilitates:

- Level of agency for CYP
- Provides a 'child lens'
- Promotes ownership
- Undertaken as part of a wider program evaluation




Using bodymapping with Champions CYP

- Undertaken over two sessions during school holidays in Sept/Oct and April 2019
- CYP were supported by coordinators
- Captured the voices of 19/22 YP participating in program



What were the outcomes of the bodymapping?



- 1. Better understanding of the views of CYP
- 2. CYP reported increases in:
 - Time spent outdoors
 - Amount of social connections and community activities
 - Feelings of psycho-social wellbeing
- 3. Used to increase the profile of the program throughout organization
- 4. Outcomes used as a guide for extending service delivery options
- 5. When used as part of mixed methods evaluation provide unique insights and additional detail

Lessons and Limitations

- Facilitation methods are vital
- Larger numbers are not necessarily better
- Capturing 'key' statements
- Participation did not vary based on age, rather length of program participation
- Useful tool for collecting program impacts
- Provided important guidance for selection of validated tools for baseline with CYP and families
- New experiences take some perfecting
