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TYPES OF ARTICLES ACCEPTED

- 1. Academic articles
- 2. Review articles (e.g., systematic reviews)
- **3.** Practice articles
- 4. Book reviews



TYPES OF ARTICLES ACCEPTED

Academic articles (5000 – 8000 words)

- Theory or philosophy-based and/or draws on empirical findings
- Contributes to literature on evaluative thinking and practice

Practice articles (3000 – 5000 words)

- Applies an evaluation theory, describes an evaluation, presents findings and disseminates practice
- Innovative methods welcomed

WHAT MAKES AN ORDINARY ARTICLE?

- Reads like a report. Dot points. Diagrams galore.
- So what? Does it say anything we didn't already know?
- Opinion. Sales pitches. "Aren't we just great!"
- No limitations, no ethical issues, no theory
- The regurgitated article. Old literature, old data, fit for the 20th century.

Think about the reader

What would make the article more interesting?

What would challenge them to think?

Is there anything controversial or contentious?

What about your positionality/bias?

Does what you say challenge conventional wisdom?

Is the article worth citing?

WHAT MAKES A REALLY GOOD ARTICLE

- 1. **Rationale:** why is this important to write about? Who will read this and why? Are there policy or practice issues that it addresses? Contributes to advancement of the evaluation knowledge-base.
- 2. Writing style: think about accessibility
- **3. Structure:** logical, conforms to usual academic conventions
- **4. Theory**: informs the methodology and the findings. It makes you think?
- 5. **Ethics:** what are risks/benefits. Cultural considerations.



FOCUSING YOUR ARTICLE

All manuscripts (except book reviews) should include two sections.

Each section should include 2 to 3 short bullet point statements addressing:

- What we already know
- The original contribution the article makes to theory and/or practice



ETHICS

All manuscripts reporting the results of an evaluation that includes human participants must provide a **statement confirming ethical review** was undertaken (e.g., by an institutional ethics review committee) or otherwise provide a brief statement of how the evaluation was conducted in compliance with appropriate ethical standards. In Australia this might include reference to the <u>AES ethical guidelines</u>.

As appropriate manuscripts should report on how **cultural safety principles** informed the evaluation. In Australia Indigenous evaluations would normally be conducted in accordance with the Australian Evaluation Society First Nations Cultural Safety Framework (Gollan & Stacey, 2021).



- 1. Write in a collaborative team

- **3.** Reference reputable articles (preferable Scopus listed)

PEER REVIEW

- 1. Helps ensure articles are suitable for journal and readers
- 2. Authors can receive detailed and constructive feedback from other experts
- 3. Alert you to errors or gaps
- 4. Create a discussion between author, reviewers, and editor around a topic.
